

Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD)

Individualized Funding FAQs

As announced in the 2018-19 Budget, \$4,000 annually is available for children under the age of six with a diagnosis of ASD. Out-of-province diagnosis will need to be reviewed and confirmed by a Saskatchewan Health Authority ASD diagnostic team.

What is Individualized Funding?

Individualized funding provides parents with funding to purchase services that best suit their child's individual needs. This will give parents the flexibility and freedom to choose from a range of therapeutic interventions and supports that will most benefit their child.

How do I know if I am eligible to receive this funding?

Only children under the age of six years who have been diagnosed with ASD will be eligible for funding. If you suspect your child has ASD, contact an ASD Consultant in the community closest to you. How do I apply?

Applications and information about the application process for the ASD Individualized Funding program are available on www.saskatchewan.ca/autism.

How do I know what services would be best for my child?

Parents/caregivers are encouraged to consult with their Saskatchewan Health Authority Autism Spectrum Disorder Consultant to assist them with identifying intervention services and supports that would be most beneficial for their child.

Why are some services eligible and some are not?

The goal of the ASD Individualized Funding program is to provide families with funds for effective interventions that result in improvements to the child's functional abilities and/or family supports (e.g. respite) that promote the well-being of the family.

The lists of eligible and ineligible services were developed with input from the Stakeholder Working Group (SWG), the public engagement survey results and best practice knowledge.

Are other interventions like art therapy, music therapy or equine therapy covered?

The initial launch of the ASD Individualized Funding program will focus on evidence-based therapy and services provided by regulated service providers. Expanding the program to include other therapies may be considered in the future.

Can I spend the funding on travel to other provinces to receive services?

Travel is permitted within Saskatchewan to access services. Allowing funds to be used for travel will provide access for families living in rural and remote areas so they can either travel to the service provider or pay the service provider to travel to them. Travel to other provinces is not eligible.

How much funding will I get every year?

Families will receive \$4,000 per year, per child under the age of six with a diagnosis of ASD.

Since this year's funding didn't start going out until August, will I get a reduced amount?

This year's funding will not be pro-rated. Families who apply and meet the program criteria will receive the full \$4,000 starting in August 2018.

When can I expect to receive the money every year? And how will I receive it?

Families will receive the first benefit upon approval of their application and future benefits will be paid annually in the month of the anniversary date of the initial application.

What if my child turns six during the year – will I receive a pro-rated amount?

No – you will receive the full annual benefit in the month of your initial application anniversary date so long as the child is under the age of six at that time.

How is the Government of Saskatchewan going to ensure families spend the money appropriately?

Parents and caregivers may be asked to participate in a future review and potential audits of receipts to verify approved services are being utilized and to provide feedback on their experience with the program and their ability to access services. This information will help assess the effectiveness of the program and help to make improvements.

The Ministry of Social Services has provided an [expense tracking sheet](#) to assist parents and caregivers in tracking expenditures, which may also be part of future reviews.

What do I do if I spend money on services that aren't eligible?

The Ministry of Social Services will follow up on a case-by-case basis and work with families to understand the circumstances surrounding the funding spent on ineligible services.

What information do I need to keep in case I am contacted for a review?

The Ministry of Social Services has provided an expense tracking sheet (INSERT LINK) to assist you in tracking your expenditures. Parents/caregivers may be asked to submit the log along with approved service invoices, if they are chosen to participate in a review. The review will focus on your experience with the program and your ability to access services, and will help assess the effectiveness of the program and make improvements.

Is ASD Individualized Funding considered income and do I have to claim it?

ASD Individualized Funding is not a taxable benefit; therefore, individuals receiving this funding do not need to claim it as income for income tax purposes.

Will autism services still be provided publicly through the Saskatchewan Health Authority?

Autism services will continue to be provided in the public system, as before. Individualized Funding is in addition to what is already available to families.
