

# Saskatchewan Consumer Price Index

May 2014

According to Statistics Canada, the Saskatchewan All-items Consumer Price Index increased 0.2 percent between April 2014 and May 2014 while the Canada All-items Index advanced 0.5 percent. The Regina and Saskatoon All-items Consumer Price Index rose 0.2 percent and 0.3 percent, respectively, during the same period.

In Saskatchewan, the May All-items Index increased from April 2014 primarily due to increased prices for traveller accommodations, gasoline, personal care services and women's clothing. Prices also rose for processed meat, fresh or frozen beef and non-alcoholic beverages.

Moderating these increases were lower prices for the purchase and operation of recreational vehicles, travel tours, the purchase and leasing of passenger vehicles and passenger vehicle insurance premiums. Prices also fell for cereal products (excluding infant food), personal care supplies and equipment and homeowners' replacement cost.

The Saskatchewan All-items Consumer Price Index advanced 2.5 percent between May 2013 and May 2014 while the Canada All-items Index increased 2.3 percent. The Regina and Saskatoon All-items Consumer Price Index climbed 2.5 percent and 2.4 percent, respectively, during the same period.

The May All-items Index increased from May 2013 primarily due to higher prices for the purchase and leasing of passenger vehicles, gasoline, electricity and food purchased from restaurants. Prices also climbed for water, cigarettes and mortgage interest cost.

These increases were partially offset by decreased prices for cereal products (excluding infant food), telephone services, non-alcoholic beverages and coffee and tea. Prices also declined for household appliances, home entertainment equipment, parts and services and inter-city transportation.
