

Saskatchewan Consumer Price Index

April 2013

According to Statistics Canada, the Saskatchewan All-items Consumer Price Index increased 0.2 percent between March 2013 and April 2013 while the Canada All-items Index declined 0.2 percent. The Regina and Saskatoon All-items Consumer Price Index rose 0.2 percent and 0.1 percent, respectively, during the same period.

In Saskatchewan, the April All-items Index increased from March 2013 primarily due to higher prices for health care services, footwear, inter-city transportation and fresh or frozen beef. Prices also increased for cigarettes, bakery products and non-alcoholic beverages.

Moderating these increases were lower prices for gasoline, purchase and leasing of passenger vehicles, fresh fruit and women's clothing. Prices also fell for dairy products, men's clothing and purchase and operation of recreational vehicles.

The Saskatchewan All-items Consumer Price Index advanced 1.0 percent between April 2012 and April 2013 while the Canada All-items Index increased 0.4 percent. The Regina and Saskatoon All-items Consumer Price Index climbed 1.4 percent and 0.6 percent, respectively, during the same period.

The April All-items Index increased from April 2012 primarily due to higher prices for rent, electricity, food purchased from restaurants and passenger vehicles insurance premiums. Prices also rose for water, tuition fees and property taxes (including special charges)

These increases were partially offset by lower prices for gasoline, home entertainment equipment, parts and services, homeowners' mortgage insurance, and purchase and leasing of passenger vehicles. Prices also fell for recreational equipment and services (excluding recreational vehicles), mortgage interest cost and purchase and operation of recreational vehicles.
