

Saskatchewan Consumer Price Index

March 2011

According to Statistics Canada, the Saskatchewan All-items Consumer Price Index increased 0.9 percent between February 2011 and March 2011 while the Canada All-items Index advanced 1.1 percent. The Regina and Saskatoon All-items Consumer Price Index rose 0.9 percent and 0.8 percent, respectively, during the same period.

In Saskatchewan, the March All-items Index increased from February 2011 primarily due to higher prices for gasoline, fresh vegetables, children's clothing and non-prescription medication. Prices also rose for women's clothing, preserved fruit and fruit preparations, and bakery products.

Moderating these increases were price reductions for sugar and confectionery, fresh fruit, and men's clothing. Prices also fell for footwear, reading material and or other printed material, the purchasing and leasing passenger vehicles and pet food and supplies.

The Saskatchewan All-items Consumer Price Index advanced 3.0 percent between March 2010 and March 2011 while the Canada All-items Index increased 3.3 percent. The Regina and Saskatoon All-items Consumer Price Index climbed 3.1 percent and 2.7 percent, respectively, during the same period.

The March All-items Index increased from March 2010 primarily due to higher prices for gasoline, fresh vegetables, and homeowners' home and mortgage insurance. Prices also rose for electricity, housing replacement cost, rent, and food purchased from restaurants.

These increases were partially offset by price decreases for prescribed medicine, natural gas, recreational equipment and services (excluding recreational vehicles). Prices also fell for fresh fruit, household appliances, home entertainment equipment parts and services and passenger vehicle insurance premiums.
