

Saskatchewan Consumer Price Index

May 2011

According to Statistics Canada, the Saskatchewan All-items Consumer Price Index increased 0.8 percent between April 2011 and May 2011 while the Canada All-items Index advanced 0.7 percent. The Regina and Saskatoon All-items Consumer Price Index both rose 0.9 percent during the same period.

In Saskatchewan, the May All-items Index increased from April 2011 primarily due to higher prices for gasoline, fresh fruit, travel accommodation and telephone service. Prices also rose for men's clothing, passenger vehicle insurance premiums and purchase and leasing of passenger vehicles.

Moderating these increases were price reductions for fuel oil, sugar and confectionary and fresh or frozen chicken. Prices also fell for women's clothing, fresh vegetables and homeowners' maintenance and repairs.

The Saskatchewan All-items Consumer Price Index advanced 3.4 percent between May 2010 and May 2011 while the Canada All-items Index increased 3.7 percent. The Regina and Saskatoon All-items Consumer Price Index climbed 3.4 percent and 3.1 percent, respectively, during the same period.

The May All-items Index increased from May 2010 primarily due to higher prices for gasoline, homeowners' and mortgage insurance, and electricity. Prices also rose for food purchased in restaurants, homeowners' replacement cost and rent.

These increases were partially offset by price decreases for women's clothing, natural gas, prescribed medicines and recreational equipment and services (excluding recreational vehicles). Prices also fell for furniture, men's clothing and clothing accessories watches and jewellery.
