

Saskatchewan Immigration 2014






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Data Set

This annual statistical report provides an overview of newcomers who have arrived in Saskatchewan in recent years. Data in this report represents newcomers who have landed in the province of Saskatchewan as Permanent Residents and Temporary Residents. Permanent residents are people that have been granted permanent resident status in Canada. Permanent residents must live in Canada for at least 730 days (two years) within a five-year period or risk losing their status. Permanent residents have all the rights guaranteed under the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms such as equality rights, legal rights, mobility rights, freedom of religion, freedom of expression and freedom of association. They do not, however, have the right to vote in elections or hold some jobs requiring high-level security clearance.

In this report, Permanent Residents may be further described as immigrants (all immigration classes including principal applicants and their spouses and dependents which include provincial nominees) or provincial nominee principal applicants (primary candidates who submit an application to a Provincial Nominee Program (PNP)). Please note: Tables labeled as provincial nominees in previous reports included both principal applicants and spouses and dependents.

Temporary Residents are foreign nationals who are lawfully in Canada on a temporary basis under the authority of a valid document issued for the purpose of entering Canada and individuals who seek asylum upon or after their arrival in Canada and remain in the country pending the outcome of processes relative to their claim. Temporary residents include foreign workers, international students, refugee claimants and other temporary residents (i.e., a work permit, study permit, or visitor visa).

Data found in the Temporary Resident portion of this publication are based on the reporting methodology used after the changes made to the Temporary Foreign Worker Program on June 20, 2014. As a result, data available differ from what has been presented in previous years. In particular, temporary resident data will now be indicative of those present in Saskatchewan on December 31st from 2012 to 2014.

These statistics measure the number of temporary residents with a valid document on December 31st of the observation year. A temporary resident who has been granted permanent resident status on or before the observation date (December 31) is excluded from the count from their grant date onwards. Temporary residents are grouped according to the principal reason for residing in Canada during the calendar year.

Saskatchewan receives data in the form of microdata from Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC). Microdata includes detailed landings information for all immigrants that arrive in Saskatchewan as Permanent and Temporary Residents.

Overview of Permanent and Temporary Residents to Saskatchewan

Immigration provides an important tool for addressing Saskatchewan's labour market and demographic challenges by increasing the pool of workers in the province and enriching the ethno-cultural mosaic of our communities.

To come to Canada permanently, foreign nationals can apply for immigration under three main classes – family class, economic class (which includes the Provincial Nominee Program), or refugee class. In Saskatchewan, the PNP is called the Saskatchewan Immigrant Nominee Program (SINP). This provincially-administered immigration program allows Saskatchewan to select and nominate prospective immigrants that would positively contribute to the economy and society, and are likely to successfully settle in Saskatchewan. Upon nomination by the SINP, prospective immigrants can apply to the federal government (IRCC) for a permanent resident visa that allows them to live and work in Canada.

The *Immigration and Refugee Protection Act,* 2002 sets out federal eligibility criteria for prospective immigrants in each class: Economic; Family; and Refugee. The Economic class includes Skilled Workers, Canadian Experience (for those with recent Canadian work experience or that have graduated and recently worked in Canada), businesspersons (investors, entrepreneurs, and self-employed) and Provincial Nominees. Family members of Canadian citizens or Permanent Residents can apply under the federal Family class. The Refugee class includes Government-assisted and Privately-sponsored refugees, refugee claimants in Canada, and the dependents of refugees abroad.

The Canada-Saskatchewan Immigration Agreement, signed in May 2005, outlines the rights and responsibilities of the federal and provincial governments with respect to Saskatchewan-selected prospective immigrants. In light of the demand for labour in specific sectors, and the positive economic and social contributions of newcomers, Saskatchewan continues to improve the SINP to attract and retain new immigrants that will contribute to Saskatchewan's economy.

The SINP operates under the federal economic class and currently administers three admission categories:

- International Skilled Workers;
- Saskatchewan Experience; and,
- Entrepreneurs and Farmers.

The SINP has education, work experience, and official language requirements that ensure positive settlement experiences in Saskatchewan. Business applicants must be prepared to make a significant investment in Saskatchewan, must actively manage that investment and must prove a minimum net worth, among other conditions.

From 2012 to 2014, 292 Saskatchewan communities saw the arrival of immigrants who were migrating from 158 different countries. As a subset of the total immigration population, provincial nominees migrated from 132 countries, arriving in 226 communities in

Saskatchewan. Temporary residents arrived from 202 different countries to 319 Saskatchewan communities.

Saskatchewan reached an all-time population high in 2014. Immigration was the greatest contributing factor, accounting for approximately 74 per cent of population growth. SINP nominees and their family members accounted for 74 per cent of new immigrants in 2013. Landings of provincial nominees have increased by 378 per cent since 2007, while federal immigration has remained relatively static, seeing a nominal 80 per cent increase over this same period.

The term "landed" indicates that an immigrant has received his/her permanent resident status. To encourage immigrants to settle and integrate, the Ministry developed a settlement and integration model in 2009 which provides funding to third party organizations to deliver settlement and language services that facilitate integration. The Ministry is committed to ensuring all services are readily accessible and provided in a timely, supportive manner, in an effort to ensure positive outcomes for immigrants, employers, and communities.

The information presented in this report uses both Permanent Resident and Temporary Resident data (current to December 2015).

Figure 2: Saskatchewan's share of Immigration to Canada (2004-2014)





Figure 3: Saskatchewan Immigrant Admissions by Class, Federal vs. Provincial Nominees (2012-2014)

Figure 4: Admissions of Immigrants to Saskatchewan by Source Region (2014)








Figure 5: Admissions of Immigrants to Saskatchewan by Gender and Age Group (2014)

Figure 7: Admissions of Refugees to Saskatchewan by Age Group and Gender (2012-2014)






Figure 8: Admissions of Government-assisted Refugees to Saskatchewan by Age Group and Gender (2012-2014)






