## 2010 In Review

### Introduction

The economic fortunes of Saskatchewan have been influenced by the world's response to the global financial crisis of 2008, as well as the more powerful but subtler shifts in the geopolitical economic ordering of the world. In order to understand Saskatchewan's circumstance, it is necessary to understand Saskatchewan's position within the larger global economy and the factors driving the global economy.

Many of the negative consequences of the financial crisis were not felt until 2009, as it took time for the financial crisis to propagate from financial centres out into the general economy. Many actions and policies initiated in 2009, such as stimulus spending and record low interest rates, came to fruition in 2010.

In 2010, many economic indicators became positive once again. The Canadian economy grew by 3.1 per cent in real terms, following a 2.5 per cent decline in 2009. The U.S. economy expanded at an annual rate of 2.9 per cent in real terms in 2010, after a decline of 2.6 per cent in 2009.

In Asia, economic growth continued at a rapid pace. China experienced 9.9 per cent real economic growth in 2010 and India grew by 9.0 per cent. To put this phenomenally high growth rate in perspective, in 2010, India and China added to their collective economies about the equivalent of the entire Canadian economy. Asia's rapid growth has contributed significantly to demand for commodities, resulting in increased prices for many of Saskatchewan's exports.



### Mining, Oil and Investment

Potash is an ingredient in fertilizer. Saskatchewan has been a major producer of potash for many decades. Potash sales fell significantly in most markets during 2009 to levels that have not been seen since the 1960s. In 2008, Saskatchewan sold 9.9 million tonnes of potash. In 2009, in the wake of the financial crisis, sales volumes plummeted to 3.7 million tonnes, a decline of over 62 per cent. In 2010, potash sales rebounded to 9.7 million tonnes.

The collapse of potash sales during the recession was driven by weak economic and financial conditions, tight credit access, high levels of inventory and purchase deferrals in a large number of potash-consuming countries.

In April, 2010 the Deepwater Horizon exploded in the Gulf of Mexico, marking the beginning of what is known as the "BP oil spill". In response to the spill, the U.S. government placed a temporary moratorium on offshore drilling. The ban encouraged investment in land-based drilling operations such as those in Saskatchewan. However, despite increasing investment in the industry, Saskatchewan's oil production has remained relatively consistent over the past ten years, with total output averaging 24.6 million cubic metres per year. Production in 2010 was 24.5 million cubic metres.

The oil industry has to expend more resources in order to merely maintain current production levels as a result of oil becoming more difficult to find and extract. Although Saskatchewan's oil production levels have remained relatively stable over the past decade, both the number and depth of wells required to maintain the level of production have increased.

Per capita investment has rebounded following the downturn in 2009 and has surpassed the previous highs of \$14,460 per person set in 2008. In 2010, Saskatchewan's per capita investment was \$15,161, not far off Alberta's per capita investment of \$18,930, and well above the Canadian average of \$9,911 per person. Investment was driven by a combination of factors the most significant being rising demand and prices for the commodities exported by Saskatchewan, large amounts

of liquidity being injected into the global financial markets by central banks all around the world, and a stable, business-friendly environment.

New capital investment reached a record high of \$15.8 billion in 2010, surpassing the previous record set in 2009 at \$14.9 billion. The record-setting year saw significant investment in the mining, oil, housing and utility sectors.

## Income and Employment

Average weekly earnings in Saskatchewan went up 5.0 per cent in 2010 and in the last five years have increased 23.6 per cent, the second-highest growth among provinces.


A large part of the income growth can be attributed to labour shortages. Saskatchewan's unemployment rate has been very low for many years and that trend continued into 2010 with an unemployment rate of 5.2 per cent, the lowest in the country. The labour shortage is the result of significant growth in employment opportunities over the past several years, which continued in 2010. In 2010, 4,800 new full time jobs were created.



## Population

There were 14,326 births in Saskatchewan in 2010 and 9,436 deaths resulting in a natural population increase of 4,890. Additionally in 2010, 10,188 more people moved to Saskatchewan than left, of which 7,499 were net immigrants from other countries and 2,689 were net immigrants from other provinces. Combined natural increase and net immigration have resulted in total population growth of 15,078 over the year. At the end of

2010, the population of Saskatchewan reached an estimated record high of 1,052,050.



As of 2010, a record number of senior citizens called Saskatchewan home. There were 152,385 residents over the age of 65. Despite the record number of senior citizens, the percentage of the population over 65 is at its lowest level in over a decade. The influx of young immigrants is principally responsible for the decline in the average age of the population. The percentage of the population over 65 decreased from a high of 14.7 per cent in 2006 to 14.2 per cent in 2010.

The majority of migrants into the province have chosen to settle in cities, accelerating the already present urbanization trend. The percentage of the population living in cities has increased from 54.0 per cent in 1998 to 61.8 per cent in 2010.

## Housing

Saskatchewan's rising population has been fueling a residential construction boom. In 2005, the value of building permits issued for residential construction totalled \$493 million. By 2010, permit values rose to \$1.15 billion, a new record.


In 2009, in the wake of the financial crisis, housing starts plummeted to 3,866 units. In 2010, housing starts rebounded to 5,907 units.

## Agriculture and the Flood of 2010

Heavy flooding reduced seeded acres to 28.8 million acres in 2010, down 15.0 per cent from 2009 and 14.3 per cent from the ten-year average. In 2010, total acres sown to wheat declined by 21.4 per cent representing 55

per cent of the total decline in acres sown. Wheat represented only 35.9 per cent of the total seeded acres in 2010 compared to the ten-year average of 41.3 per cent. Consistent with the long-term trend, as wheat's share of the crop mix declined, the share of acres seeded to canola and specialty crops increased.

The price of agricultural land and buildings have been rising in the last few years, increasing by 5.0 per cent during 2010 alone. The rising price of agricultural land is the largest component of increasing equity experienced by Saskatchewan farmers. Land and building prices are rising because of rising commodity prices and low interest rates.



## Utilities

Rapid growth, especially in heavy industrial and mineral production, has been driving increases in Saskatchewan's electricity production. Saskatchewan produced a record amount of electricity in 2010, 20,759 GWh, surpassing the previous record of 20,571 GWh set in 2007. For several years prior to 2008, Saskatchewan had been a net exporter of electricity, but for the past three years, Saskatchewan has been a net importer of electricity. In 2010, Saskatchewan had net electricity imports of 274 GWh, most of which came from Manitoba.

In 2009, the number of wireless connections to SaskTel's network exceeded the number of wired connections to the network for the first time. That trend has continued into 2010 resulting in an additional 40,358 more wireless connections than wired connections.

## The Ascent of Saskatoon

In 2010, Saskatoon experienced the largest share of housing starts in Saskatchewan with 2,381,

approximately 40 per cent of all housing starts in the province and 77 per cent more than Regina's 1,347 housing starts. In 2004, the difference between housing starts in Saskatoon and Regina was only 27 per cent. From 2000 to 2010, Saskatoon experienced an average growth in the value of building permits of 16.4 per cent. This is slightly above Regina's average rate of 16.1 per cent, but is significantly above Calgary which experienced a growth in the value of building permits of only 6.5 per cent over the same time period.

Saskatoon experienced 2.8 per cent population growth in 2010, exceeding Regina's 2.3 per cent and Calgary's 1.8 per cent.

## Conclusion

Saskatchewan's economy has proven itself to be both robust and resilient in the face of the global economic crisis. Despite the global economic crisis, Saskatchewan's population, employment and incomes continued to grow. In 2010, Saskatchewan's economic recovery became well entrenched.

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

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





Table 21: Private and Public Investment by Industry, Saskatchewan

Table 22: Per Capita Capital Investment, Canada and the Western Provinces











Table 35: Current Value of Farm Capital, Saskatchewan





**Table 50: Air Traffic – Inbound and Outbound Passengers**





**Table 52: United States Visitors Entering Saskatchewan by Type of Transportation**


