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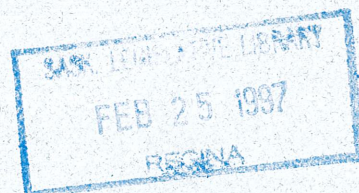

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## Foreword

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Saskatchewan's economy grew in 1996 for the fourth consecutive year. Most economic indicators show a sharp, consistent improvement over 1995.

Crop production increased over last year's level, investment spending in the oil and natural gas industries rose significantly, oil and uranium output and sales surged and manufacturing shipments improved.

The Province's economic growth was bolstered by high grain prices and a steep rise in crop production. Despite the cool fall weather, Saskatchewan farmers produced an average quality crop.

The strength in oil and uranium prices sped up production and sales of both mineral products. As well, drilling activity for oil and natural gas increased significantly in 1996.

Consumer spending accelerated during the year as evidenced by the surge in retail sales, new motor vehicle sales, housing starts and existing home sales. The increase reflects rising incomes, low and affordable interest rates, a rising provincial population and consumer confidence.

Strong consumer spending, which accounted for well over half of the Province's Gross Domestic Product (GDP), complemented the strong performance of agriculture, mining and manufacturing sectors in 1996.

Full-time employment accelerated in 1996. Employment growth last year was particularly strong in mining, retail trade and business services. The number of unemployed persons in the Province declined to 33,000 in 1996, the lowest level since 1983. Saskatchewan's unemployment rate of 6.6 per cent in 1996 was the lowest in all of Canada.

Saskatchewan's economy has grown faster than expected in 1996 and that is creating confidence about the future direction of the Province's economy.

## 1996 In Review

### Saskatchewan's Economy

Saskatchewan's economy will grow in 1996 at a faster rate than in 1995, led by agriculture, manufacturing, mining and trade. Prices for wheat remain relatively high due to strong global demand and low inventories. Oil and uranium prices are also helped by high global demand. The upturn in commodity prices should improve business and consumer confidence and lead to higher economic activity.

### Retail Sales

Retail sales in the province during the first ten months of 1996 reached \$5.7 billion, an increase of almost 8 per cent from the same period last year. Saskatchewan's retail sales growth rate is above the national average. Sales by recreational and motor vehicle dealers were especially significant, increasing in value by over 21 per cent in the first ten months of this year from the comparable period last year.

According to a Conference Board of Canada survey of Canadian households, consumer confidence in 1996 is the strongest in Saskatchewan. Higher farm cash income in 1996 is contributing to this attitude and is boosting retail sales.

### Manufacturing Shipments

Manufacturing shipments posted growth in the first ten months of this year. Total shipments increased 8 per cent over the period, a healthy advance over last year's strong performance. Large increases in shipments of food products, non-metallic mineral products, fabricated metal products, machinery and electrical products have occurred in response to increased demand. Some of this demand is from the province's farmers who are purchasing new farm implements.

### Agriculture

Farm cash receipts in Saskatchewan totalled \$4.3 billion in the first three quarters of 1996, an increase of 11.4 per cent over the same period in 1995. Saskatchewan farmers harvested an estimated 28.5 million tonnes of

the major grains, oilseeds and specialty crops this year. This crop is 23 per cent above the 1995 production level of 23.2 million tonnes and 29 per cent above the ten-year average of 22.2 million tonnes.

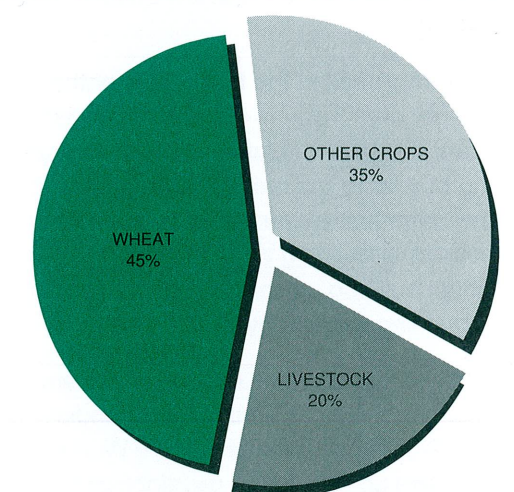
A late harvest across the province hurt crop quality. With 97 per cent of the crop harvested at the middle of November, 46 per cent of spring wheat is expected to grade No. 1 Canada Western and 23 per cent to grade No. 2 Canada Western. Producers in the province seeded an above-average acreage of durum, oats, barley and flax.

The increasing diversification of Saskatchewan's agriculture industry continued this year. Saskatchewan producers seeded a record acreage of canary seed and an above average acreage of mustard, sunflowers, lentils and field peas.

The cattle industry expanded in the first ten months of 1996 with a 19 per cent increase in feeder and slaughter cattle marketings over the same period in 1995.

A new canola crushing plant in Clavet began operations in 1996 and will crush up to 2,000 tonnes a day to produce canola oil for export and canola meal for livestock feed. Inland grain terminals are being built in cities and rural centres across the province. Large terminals in regional trading centres are gradually replacing elevators in smaller communities.

## Mining

Oil production for the first nine months of 1996 was 15.2 million cubic metres, an increase of 11.8 per cent from the same period last year. The value of oil sales over the same period increased 24.8 per cent. Cold weather in the first quarter of 1996 resulted in lower oil inventories, leading to higher prices. Production of natural gas for the first nine months of 1996 decreased 8.3 per cent from a comparable period last year. The value of natural gas sales declined almost five per cent over the same period due to supply bottlenecks. Prices were lower in Western Canada and higher in the rest of North America because of insufficient pipeline capacity to export production.

Relatively high oil and gas prices in the first half of 1996 prompted producers to increase drilling. The first ten months of 1996 saw almost 26 per cent more oil wells drilled and 54 per cent more gas wells drilled than in the same period in 1995.

The volume of potash production for the first ten months of 1996 decreased about 15 per cent and the value of sales fell 9 per cent. Off-shore sales have not kept pace with 1995 activity.

World supply of uranium is diminishing and Saskatchewan mines are responding by increasing production. The volume of uranium production increased almost 21 per cent in the first nine months of 1996 while the value of uranium sales improved by over 64 per cent.

## Construction

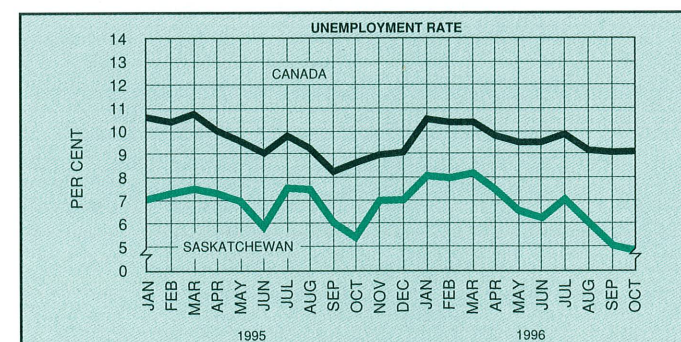
Housing starts improved in the first nine months of 1996, increasing 56 per cent from the same period last year. Consumer confidence and relatively low mortgage rates are attracting buyers to the market. The value of building permits grew in the first eleven months of 1996, with the value of institutional building permits rising by 41 per cent, residential building permits by 38 per cent and commercial building permits by 24 per cent.

Fertilizer plant and potash mine expansions in smaller centres are among the significant projects underway in 1996. As well, the on-going Infrastructure Works Program and McClean Lake uranium mine development continue to provide stimulus to this sector of the economy.

## Employment

Employment rose in 1996 and Saskatchewan's unemployment rate remained the lowest of the ten provinces as job creation matched labour force growth in the province. Employment in 1996 averaged 461,000 persons, an increase of 1,000 from 1995. A number of programs are in place in Saskatchewan to ensure employment growth will continue. The Canada-Saskatchewan Infrastructure Works Program continues to provide a boost to employment with projects located across the province. The JobStart and Future Skills programs were merged to provide a single training and employment program for youth, the unemployed and other designated groups. The average level of youth employment, aged 15 to 24, rose to 77,900 persons in 1996, an increase of 400 from 1995. Business and personal service employment averaged 159,200 persons in 1996, a rise of 5,400 from 1995.

Saskatchewan had the lowest provincial unemployment rate in 1996, averaging 6.6 per cent, while Canada's national unemployment rate averaged 9.7 per cent in 1996. Saskatchewan also had the lowest provincial rate of unemployment in 1995, averaging 6.9 per cent for the year, while the national unemployment rate averaged 9.5 per cent. The long-term trend for Saskatchewan's unemployment rate is below the national average.



## International Developments

Growth in most regions of the world has been slow in 1996, especially in the major industrialized countries. Moderate growth has characterized the economics of North America, the United Kingdom and Japan in 1996 while growth in Europe has been mixed.

The North American region is powered by sustained growth in the United States. The exchange rate between the United States and Canada has been stable throughout 1996 while the Mexican peso slowed its depreciation against the U.S. dollar. Canada and Mexico are experiencing trade surpluses in 1996, in great measure due to U.S. demand. Canada continues to have stable prices although the threat of inflation is growing in the United States and inflation remains a serious problem in Mexico. North American economic growth is expected to remain steady over the last half of the year, provided interest rate hikes in the United States are not large and U.S. export demand remains strong.

Growth is accelerating in the United Kingdom. Employment gains and lower taxes are promoting consumer confidence and are fuelling domestic demand for housing and consumer goods. Exports are hindered by low demand on the European continent but should grow along with the European economy.

Japan's economy is on the road to recovery after an extended period of weakness. A huge expansion in GDP in the first quarter of 1996 was the result of higher consumer spending and public investment. At the same time, a significant depreciation of the yen boosted export growth. Monetary policy in Japan remains loose because inflation is under control and low interest rates help the financial sector deal with bad loans from the "bubble" years.

## The Canadian Economy

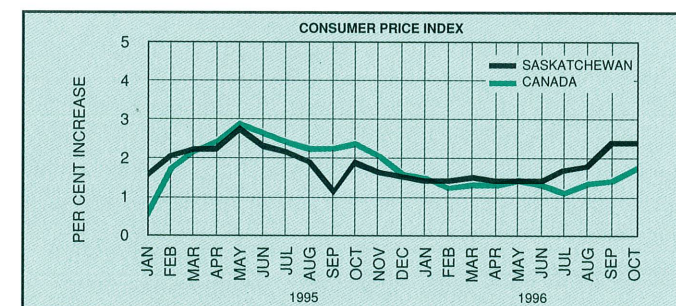
The Canadian economy recorded a modest 1.1 per cent real annualized growth rate in the first three quarters of 1996. Real GDP growth in 1996 is limited by government restraint, slower business inventory build-ups and sluggish consumer spending.

Export performance was weak in the first quarter of 1996 due to an automobile production stoppage triggered by a strike in the United States. The U.S. economy, currently running at full capacity, requires Canadian goods such as auto parts, pulp and newsprint, oil and gas and machinery. A strong U.S. economy should ensure greater activity in the Canadian export sector. Global demand for Canadian minerals and agricultural products should remain healthy over the near term.

Annualized GDP growth in the third quarter of 1996 was 3.3 per cent, the largest quarterly gain since the fourth quarter of 1994. Third quarter growth was assisted by demand for business machinery, housing and Canada's exports. Consumer demand remained flat as household income grew slowly.

There is almost no indication in 1996 of inflationary pressures on the Canadian economy. Recent wage settlement gains have been small due to excess industrial capacity, volatile labour market conditions and a reduction in inflationary expectations. It is expected that the inflation rate will remain well within the Bank of Canada's target inflation range of one to three per cent this year.

Employment growth, with the exception of the public sector, is expected to continue this year. The average level of total employment in Canada increased 1.3 per cent in 1996 over 1995.

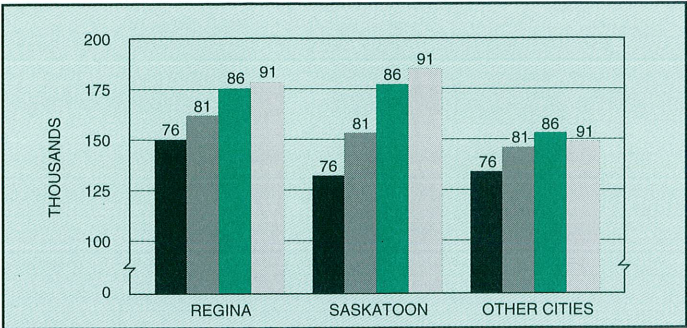

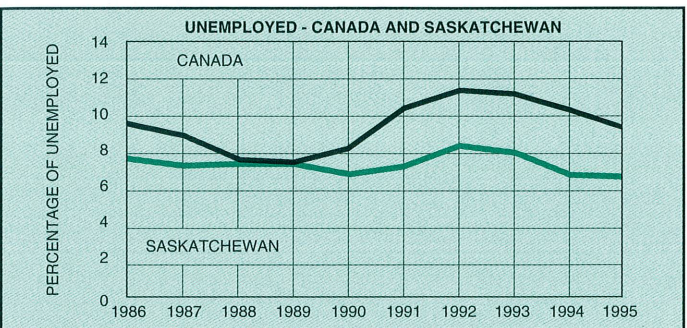

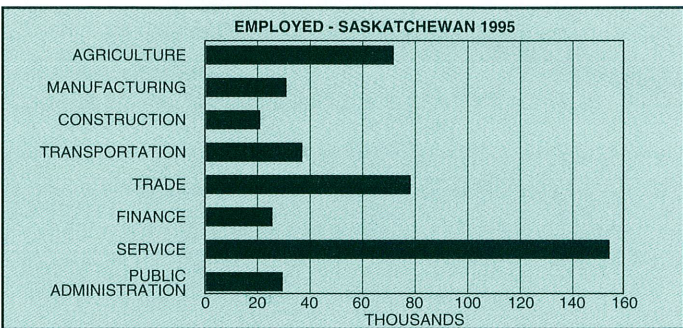

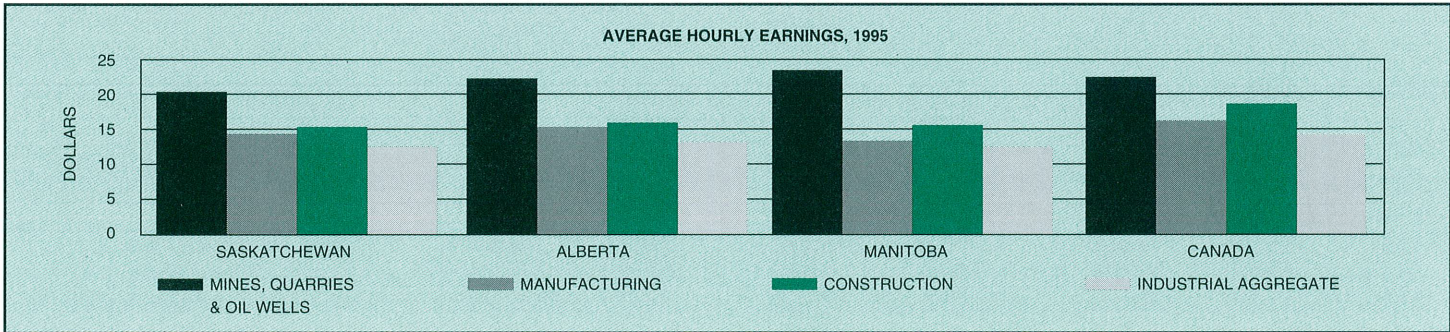
Table 10: Employed by Industry, Saskatchewan

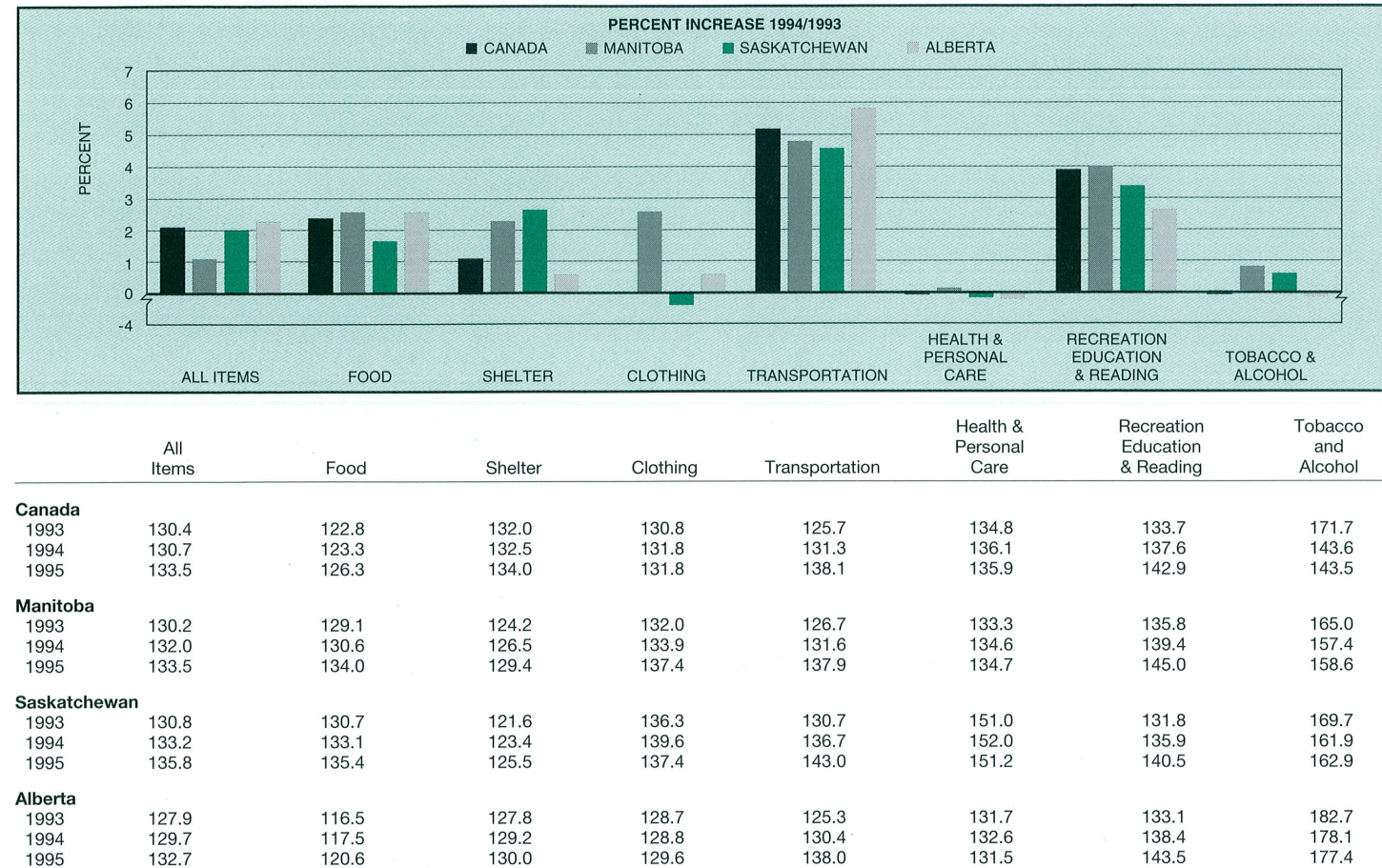

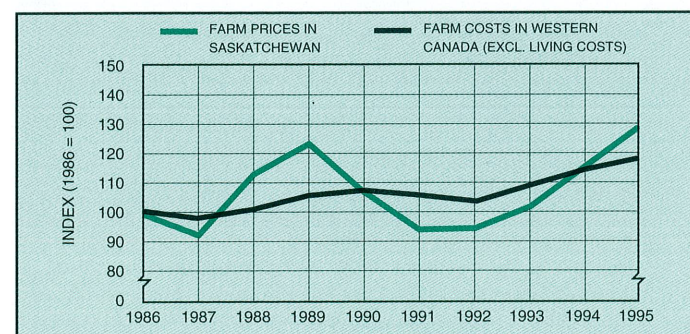


Table 18: Consumer Price Indexes, Canada, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta (1986=100)

Table 19: Indexes of Farm Product Prices and Farm Costs (1986 = 100)



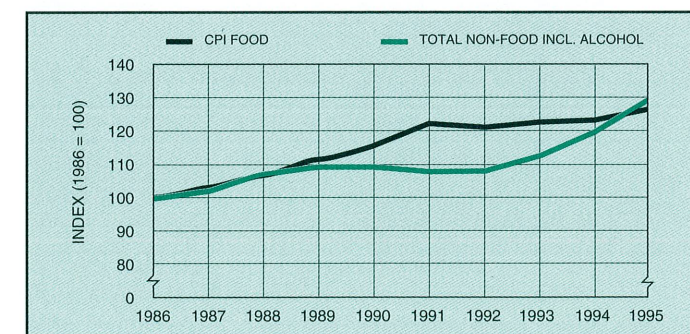

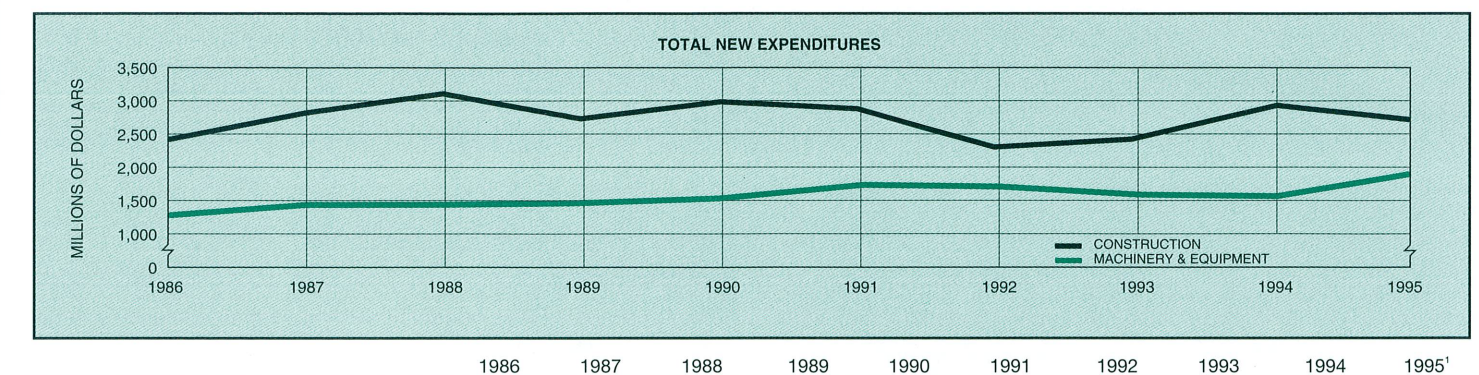

Table 21: Private and Public Investment by Industry, Saskatchewan



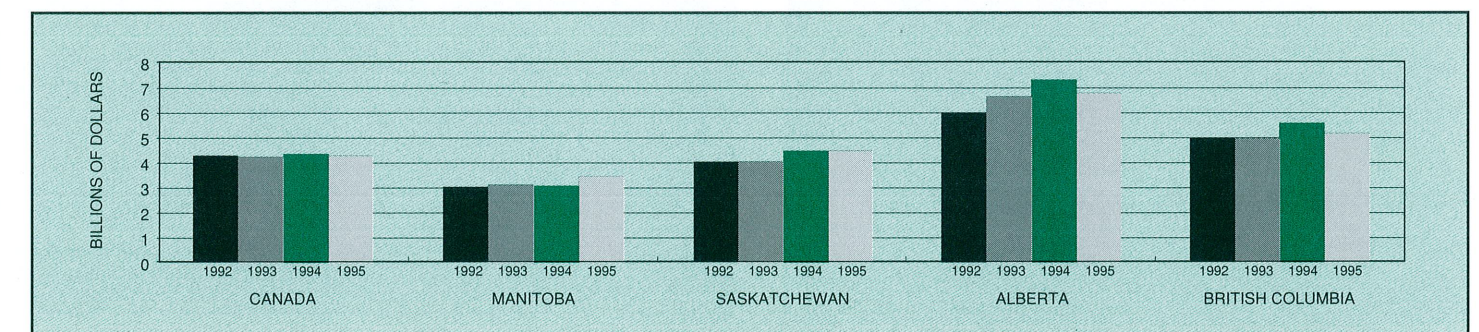

Table 22: Per Capita Capital Investment, Canada and the Western Provinces



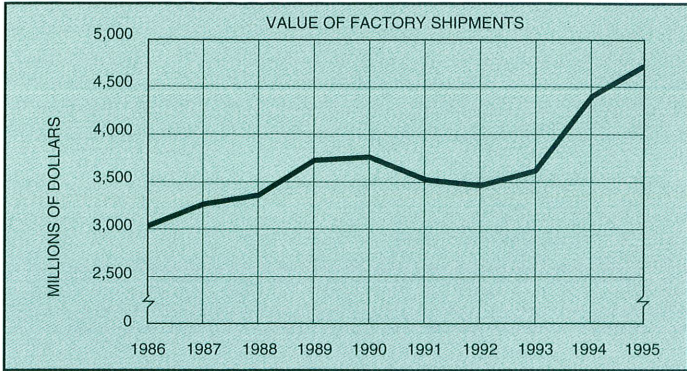

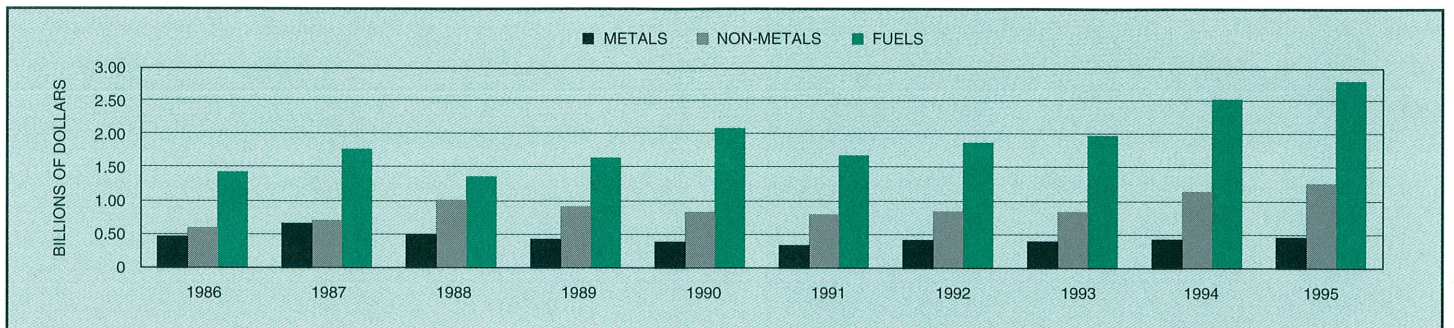

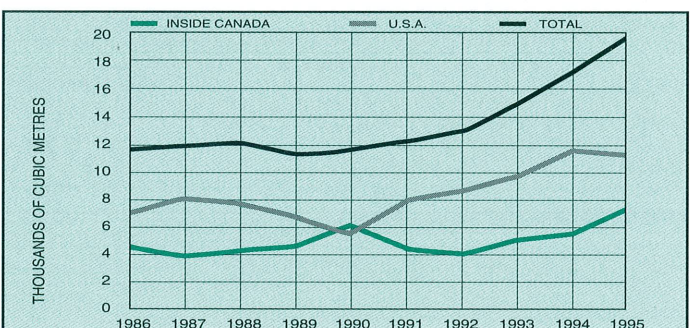

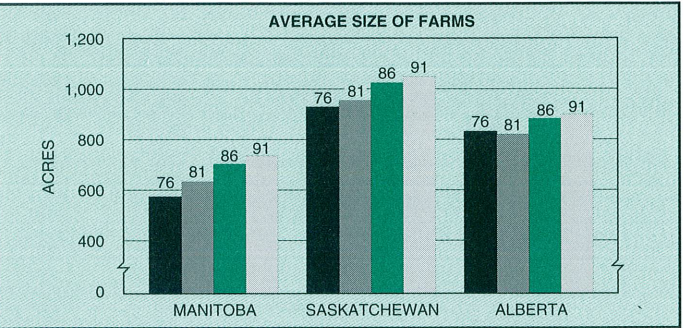

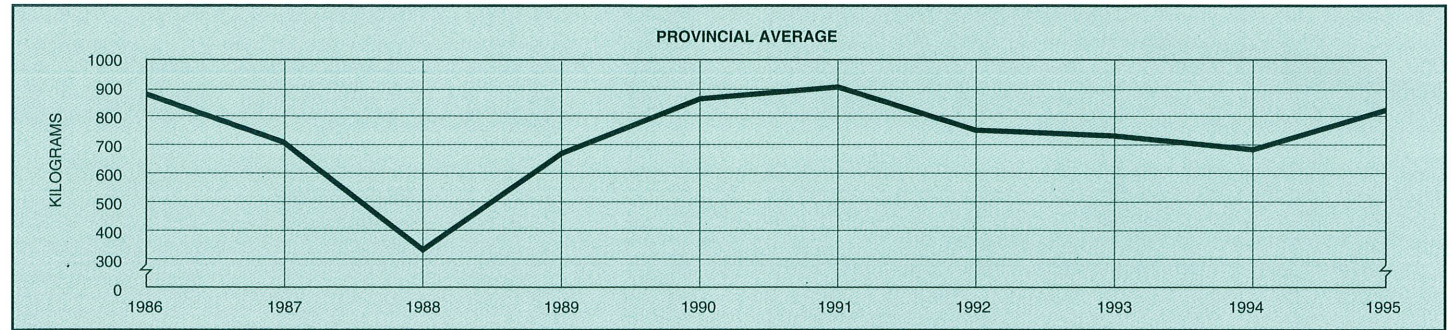

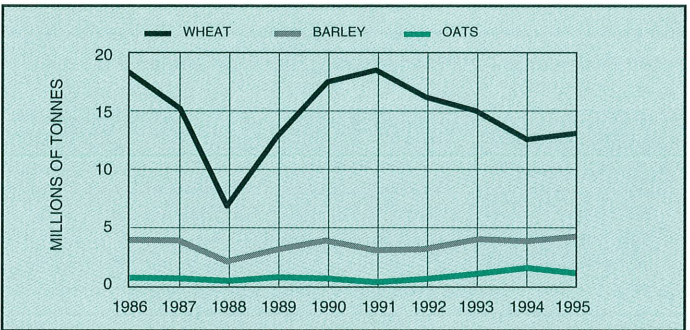

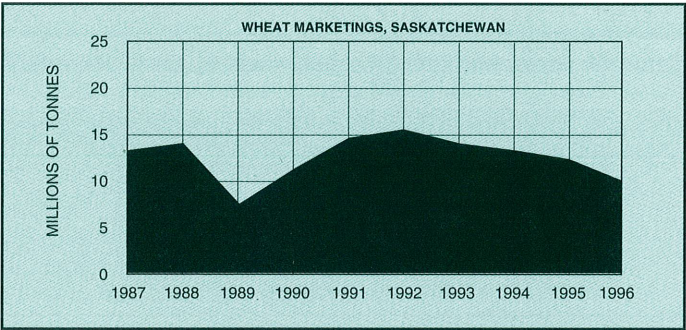

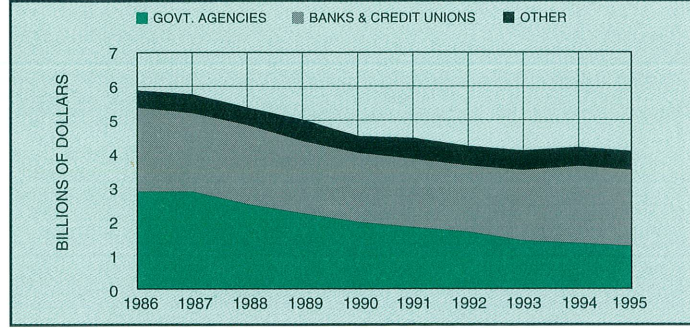

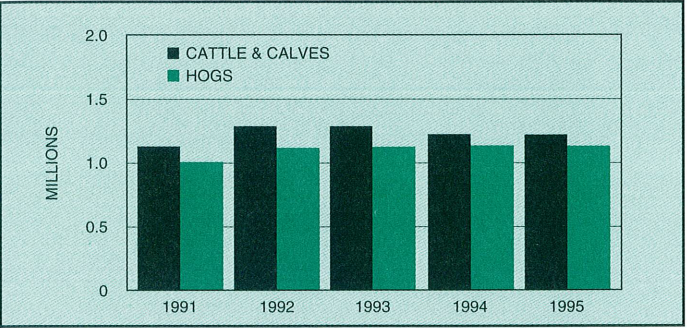

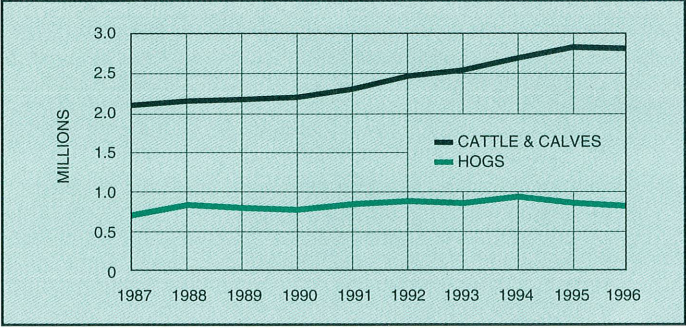

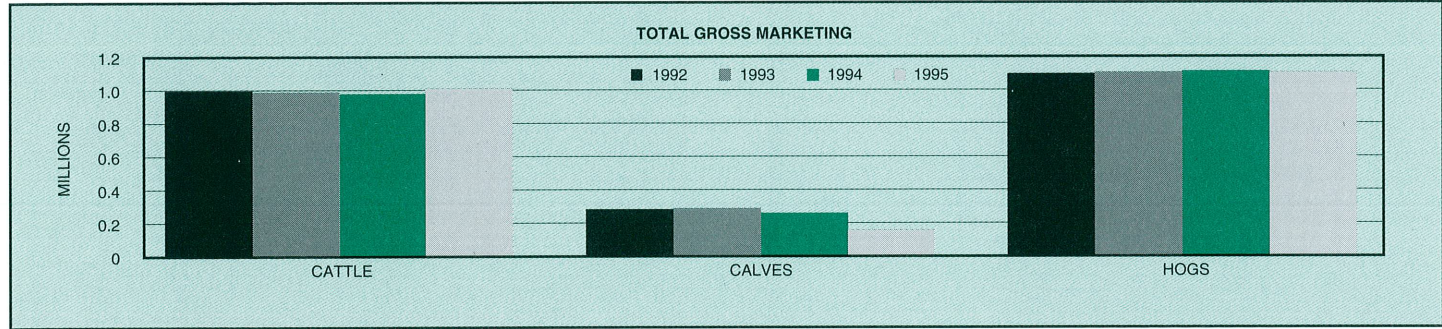

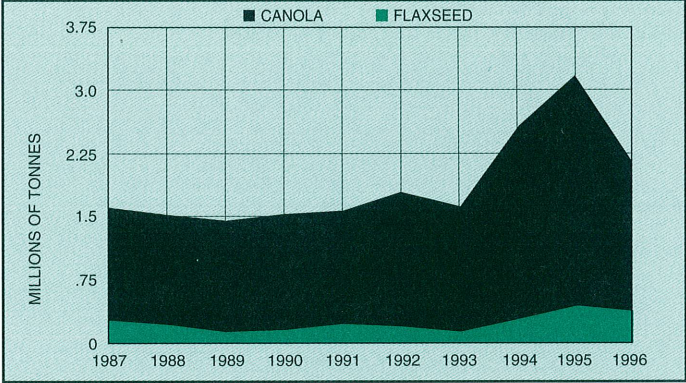

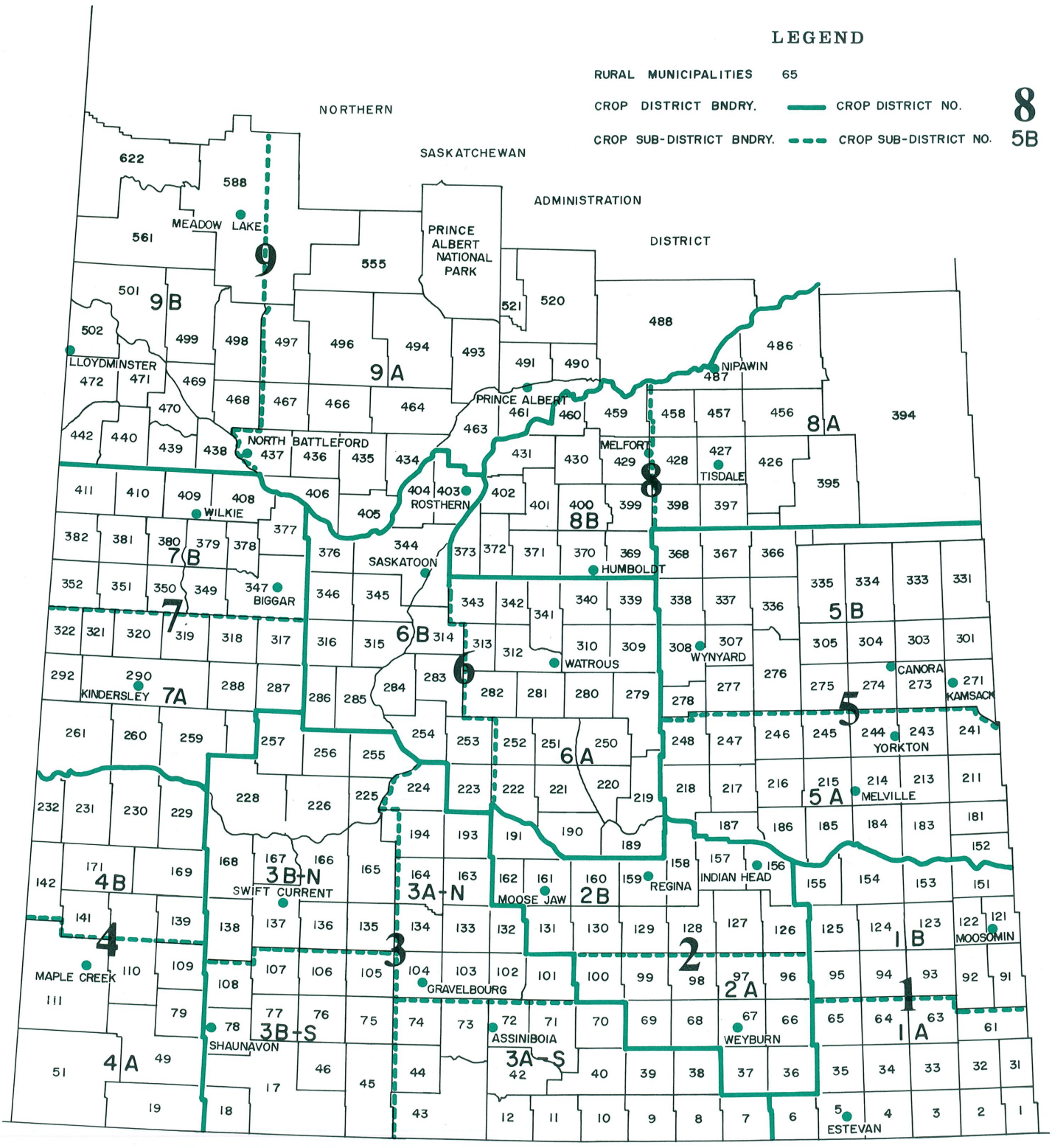

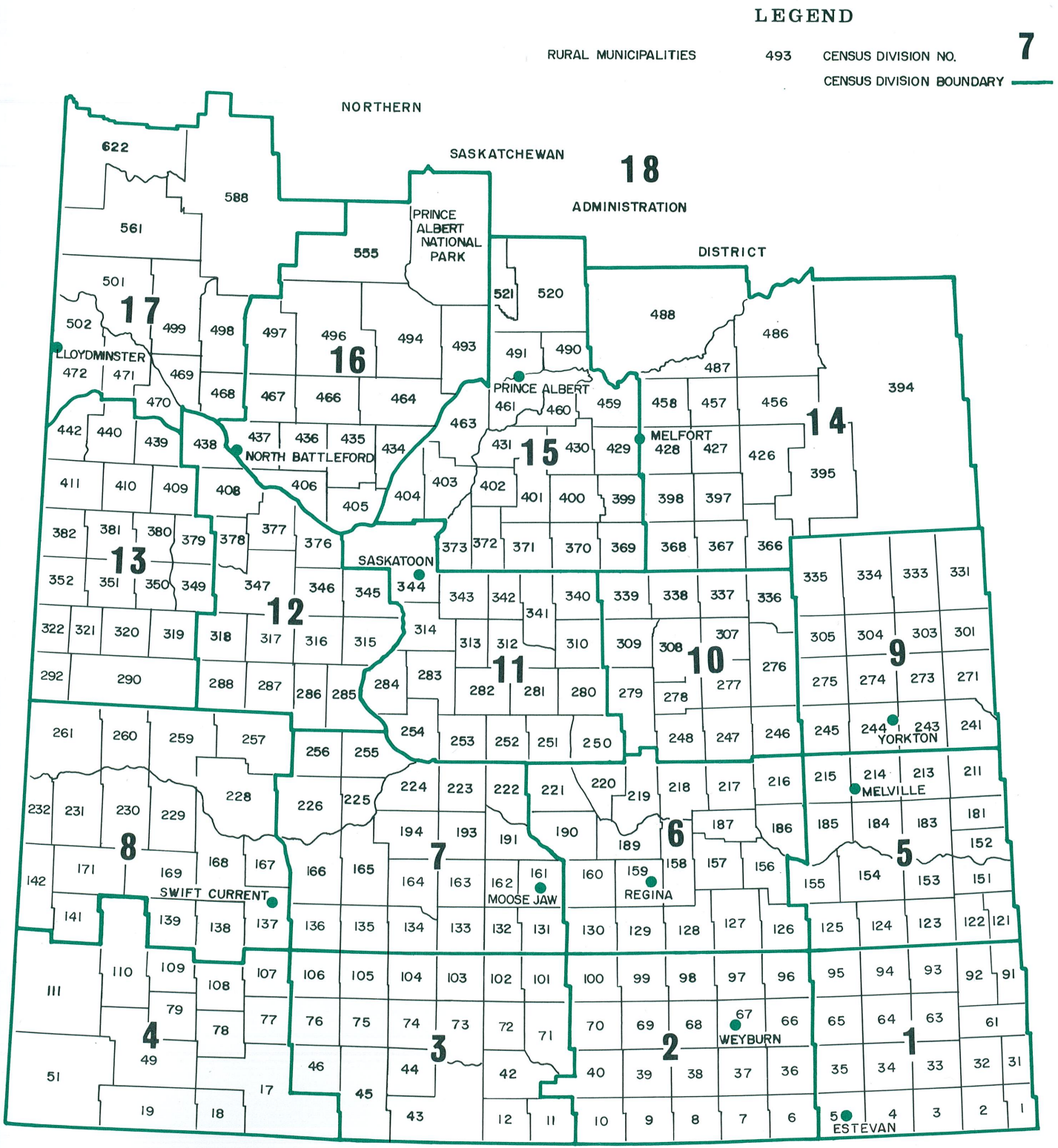

The Saskatchewan Bureau of Statistics has developed a set of economic accounts which can be used to trace the development and growth of the Saskatchewan economy.

The purpose of the accounts is to measure the value of economic activity in each sector of the economy. This is done by means of a balancing set of accounts similar to the annual income and expenditure statements of a commercial enterprise.

The accounts have many useful functions. They consolidate information which is now provided through a number of scattered sources and organize it into a central framework. This allows many kinds of economic analysis to be performed ranging from monitoring current economic performance to analysis of structural change in the economy.

The Saskatchewan Bureau of Statistics has available upon request, many more detailed tables and other information concerning the Saskatchewan Economic Accounts.

Saskatchewan Economic Accounts

Saskatchewan Gross Domestic Product (GDP) measures the total value of goods and services produced annually in the province. By removing the effects of inflation, it is possible to measure the volume of output. After adjusting for price changes, Saskatchewan's real Gross Domestic Product increased by 1.7 percent in 1995.

In nominal terms, Saskatchewan's GDP increased by 3.5 percent in 1995 to \$25,384 million. Personal expenditure on consumer goods and services rose by 3.4 percent as increased expenditures occurred in food, beverages and tobacco, rent, automobiles, recreational services, and financial, legal and other personal services. These increases were partially offset by a marginal decrease in government current expenditure on goods and services.

Total investment increased 2.6 percent over 1994 despite a 15.7 percent decrease in government investment. Business investment rose 5.1 percent as growth occurred in manufacturing, communication, retail and wholesale trade, finance insurance and real estate, and commercial services.

The value of physical change in inventories increased in 1995 as higher grain production overtook exports.

Nominal exports increased by 5.2 percent over 1994 levels following advances in crude oil, potash, uranium, manufactured goods, and tourism. Nominal imports rose by 9.8 percent in 1995 as manufactured and wholesale trade goods from Canada and imports cleared through Saskatchewan custom ports increased.

Final domestic demand for goods and services by individuals, the government and for investment purposes rose by 1.6 percent over 1994 levels, after adjustments for inflation. Real personal expenditure on consumer goods and services increased by 1.8 percent, government expenditures on goods and services declined by 1.6 percent and gross fixed capital formation increased by 3.9 percent.

This document represents an update to the Saskatchewan economic accounts, released in June 1996. Periodic revisions are common to all economic series to improve the accuracy, reliability and consistency of the data.
