Foreword

The Province's real economic growth rate in 1993 was raised to an annual rate of 4.7 per cent by a higher level of crop production and advances in mining (particularly oil and gas drilling), manufacturing, retail trade, transportation, communication and storage, and in finance, insurance and real estate.

Saskatchewan's economy shifted into higher gear in 1994 with many industries on a faster growth track compared to last year.

Prices for a number of products important to the Province have risen. Oil prices have recovered from earlier weakness. Although natural gas prices have dropped recently, they remain above year-ago levels. As well, potash prices have risen.

All components of mining show increases in both production and sales from last year.


In agriculture, higher prices for wheat, canola and other crops will combine with this year's high quality crop to raise the value of crop production and farmers' incomes.

The gradual improvement in pulp and paper markets will help forest product companies in the Province.

Wood products are currently leading the surge in manufacturing shipments, along with machinery.

Elsewhere in the economy, Saskatchewan retailers look forward to stronger sales during Christmas on top of the strongest growth in retail sales in all of Canada during the first eight months of 1994.

The economic turnaround is reflected in the dramatic decline in out-migration and the consequent increase in the population of the Province. Saskatchewan's rising population, which has been underway since 1992, demonstrates renewed confidence in the Province's future.

1994 In Review

International Developments

Growth in the global economy is expected to gather momentum in 1994 as output continues to expand in Canada, the United States and the United Kingdom, along with the modest recoveries under way in continental Europe and Japan.

The high levels of unemployment experienced in the past year are steadily improving across the industrialized countries, with the exception of continental Europe.

The United States' economy is enjoying a continued expansion of output this year, along with higher levels of employment, income and profit gains. Increased demand for imports within the United States has boosted economic activity in other countries such as Canada and Mexico. However, growth could be moderated next year by further restrictions in both fiscal and monetary policies.

Expansion in the United Kingdom remains steady and other European countries, in particular Germany, France and Italy, are beginning to recover from the recessions that have plagued them in past years.

Japan appears to be emerging from its longest recession since the Second World War. Certain factors are expected to inhibit the recovery process; specifically the appreciating yen and the political uncertainty experienced so far this year.

The ambivalent future of international financial markets poses a risk to the outlook of growth in the world economy, especially if bond yields continue to rise and the U.S. dollar further depreciates. This could significantly discourage business investment as well as residential construction. Alternatively, stronger-than-expected corporate profits could result in a more buoyant business investment, and continued improvements in consumer confidence could lead to a greater fervour in consumer spending.

The Canadian Economy

The Canadian economy recorded a 6.4 per cent annualized growth rate in the second quarter of 1994 following a 4.4 per cent annualized increase in the first quarter, despite higher interest rates. The second quarter increase was the strongest quarterly growth rate since the fourth quarter of 1987. Although current economic indicators point to some slowing in the third quarter, improvements in economic growth are expected in the fourth quarter of 1994.

Exports have continued to be the driving force of economic expansion in Canada. In the first quarter real export growth rose by 4.4 per cent and, more strikingly, by 17.2 per cent in the second quarter in inflation-adjusted terms.

Other components of demand also increased, with the exception of government spending which fell in the first two quarters. Consumer spending grew at a seasonally adjusted annualized rate of 4.4 per cent in the first quarter and 2.8 per cent in the second quarter. Business investment in fixed capital increased 1.6 per cent in the first quarter and, even more impressive, to 17.6 per cent in the second quarter, also at a seasonally adjusted annualized rate.

Canadian inflation is expected to remain low in 1994. Reductions in the federal excise tax on tobacco products at the beginning of this year, as well as the



subsequent drop in tobacco taxes in a number of provinces, were mainly responsible for the low inflation rates for Canada so far this year. These tax changes are expected to continue to affect the Consumer Price Index for the rest of the year. Total employment in Canada increased by 327,000 in the first 9 months of 1994. In August, 22,000 jobs were created resulting in 12.68 million employed which surpasses the pre-recession level of 12.66 million reached in April 1990.


Saskatchewan's Economy

There are many positive signs that suggest Saskatchewan's economy will continue to grow in 1994 and 1995. Employment in the non-agriculture sectors continues to show positive growth as the unemployment rate remains the lowest in the country. The Agricultural sector of the province has encountered a dramatic shift from wheat to canola production this year encouraged by sharp increases in canola prices in the earlier months of the year. Even with a record harvest this year, international demand is expected to maintain prices at a high level. The quality crop produced this year will serve to reinforce gains in construction, manufacturing, mining and trade.

Employment

Although farm employment has decreased, non-agricultural employment has increased in each of the 9 months this year when compared to the previous year. The average level of non-agricultural employment increased by 2.5 per cent in the first nine months of 1994 from a comparable period in 1993. The Canada-Saskatchewan Infrastructure Works Program announced in January has added an additional boost to employment this year, and will continue to do so over the next couple of years. During the first 9 months of 1994, Saskatchewan's total employment averaged 439,100 persons.

Saskatchewan's unemployment rate has averaged 7.3 per cent in the first 9 months of 1994, the lowest of the ten provinces, while Canada's national unemployment rate has averaged 10.7 per cent in the same period. The unemployment rate for the province averaged 8.3 per cent in 1993 during the first 9 months, while the national unemployment rate averaged 11.4 per cent.



Retail Sales

Retail sales have recorded strong growth in the first 8 months of 1994 from a comparable period in 1993, a positive indication that the economy continues to improve this year. Cumulative retail sales from January to August reached \$4.0 billion, an increase of 9.1 per cent from the previous year.


Manufacturing Shipments

Manufacturing shipments have increased more than 16 per cent during the first 8 months of 1994, a healthy increase over last year's performance. Current indicators show significantly higher shipments of wood products, machinery, clothing, and non-metallic products in response to increased demand.

Agriculture

The 1994 crop harvest is the fifth largest on record, with production estimated at 22.8 million tonnes. Although this is below the 1993 production of 24.5 million tonnes, it is still eight per cent above the ten-year (1984-1993) average of 21.1 million tonnes.

Unlike previous years, the quality of the crop was well above average. Of the Spring wheat crop, 93 per cent was expected to grade 1 and 2 Canada Western (CW). Ninety-eight per cent of the canola and 73 per cent of the durum crop was estimated to grade in the top two levels. Producers in the province seeded record acreage of canola, mustard, lentils, field peas and canary seed, and above average acreage of durum, oats, barley, spring rye, flax and sunflowers.



Mining

Drilling activity is expected to continue to increase this year. There have been 1905 wells drilled from January to October 14 this year compared to 1641 wells drilled in the same period in 1993, an increase of 16.1 per cent.

Oil production for the first 7 months of 1994 was 9.7 million cubic metres, an increase of 16.9 per cent from the same period last year. The value of oil sales over the same period increased 16.8 per cent.

Production of natural gas for the first 7 months of 1994 increased 8.0 per cent from a comparable period in 1993. The value of natural gas sales over the same period increased 53.2 per cent.

Potash production for the first 7 months of 1994 has increased by 19.0 per cent in volume and potash sales in dollars has risen by 28.3 per cent. The volume of uranium production has increased by 8.4 per cent while the value of uranium sales has improved by 20.5 per cent during the same period, indicating strong world demand for Saskatchewan primary products.

Construction

The value of building permits, primarily for institutional and governmental purposes, has increased 5.4 per cent in the first 8 months of this year. The Infrastructure Works Program and several mining projects are expected to provide additional stimulus in this sector.

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Table 1: Population, Canada and Saskatchewan by Sex






Table 2: Saskatchewan Components of Population Change

Table 3: Population, Saskatchewan Distribution by Age Groups



Table 5: City Population, Saskatchewan




Table 6: Percentage Distribution of Population by Place of Residence



Table 9: Labour Force, Annual Averages Canada and Saskatchewan







Table 15: New Motor Vehicle Sales, Saskatchewan





Table 18: Consumer Price Indexes, Canada, Regina, Saskatoon and Selected Cities (1986=100)





Table 20: Industry Selling Price Indexes, Canada (1986 = 100)








Table 21: Private and Public Investment by Industry, Saskatchewan





Table 44: Outstanding Farm Debt as of December 31, Saskatchewan





Table 45: Gross Marketings of Livestock by Crop District, Saskatchewan







Table 51: Air Traffic - Inbound and Outbound Passengers







Table 57: Provincial Highways by Surface Type, Saskatchewan¹








Table 59: Gross Fixed Capital Formation, by Industry, on a GDP Basis, Saskatchewan


Table 60: Number of Locations and Total Receipts for Major Accommodation Groups, Saskatchewan





Saskatchewan Economic Accounts

The Saskatchewan Bureau of Statistics has developed a set of economic accounts which can be used to trace the development and growth of the Saskatchewan economy.

The purpose of the accounts is to measure the value of economic activity in each sector of the economy. This is done by means of a balancing set of accounts similar to the annual income and expenditure statements of a commercial enterprise.

The accounts have many useful functions. They consolidate information which is now provided through a number of scattered sources and organize it into a central framework. This allows many kinds of economic analysis to be performed ranging from monitoring current economic performance to analysis of structural change in the economy.

The Saskatchewan Bureau of Statistics has available upon request, many more detailed tables and other information concerning the Saskatchewan Economic Accounts.

Saskatchewan Economic Accounts 1983 to 1993

Saskatchewan Economic Accounts

Saskatchewan Gross Domestic Product (GDP) measures the total value of goods and services in the province. By removing the effects of inflation, it is possible to measure the volume of output. After adjusting for price changes, Saskatchewan's real Gross Domestic Product increased by 4.7 percent in 1993.

In nominal terms, Saskatchewan's GDP increased by 5.9 percent in 1993 to \$21,418 million. Unadjusted personal expenditure on consumer goods and services rose by 4.0 percent, with non-durable goods contributing the most to the increase. Farm inventories and grain in commercial channels increased significantly in 1993 due to an above average harvest of all grains. Nominal exports increased by 6.5 percent over 1992 levels, as lumber, crude oil, selected exports laden in Saskatchewan, manufactured goods and tourism increased. These increases were partially offset by an 8.1 percent decline in unadjusted total gross fixed capital formation. Within this category notable declines

occurred in business machinery and equipment, business non-residential construction and business residential construction.

Final domestic demand for goods and services by individuals, the government and for investment purposes declined by 1.3 percent over 1992 levels, after adjustments for inflation. Real personal expenditure on consumer goods and services increased by 2.1 percent, government expenditures on goods and services declined by 1.7 percent and gross fixed capital formation fell by 9.9 percent. Real business investment declined in all areas while real government investment advanced in machinery and equipment and non-residential construction.

This document represents an update to the Saskatchewan economic accounts, released in June 1994. Periodic revisions are common to all economic series to improve the accuracy, reliability and consistency of the data.
